From the Priest in Charge

Dear Friends,

Numbers in scripture are especially significant as they are often used to convey a deeper meaning than simply to give a measurement.

One of the most significant is the number *forty*. It is used to mark time periods with a dominant theme, often either a time of trial or testing; or to point to a transition from one time period to another.

We encounter it as this month opens with the feast of *Candlemas*. It marks the first time that Christ comes to Jerusalem to be presented in the Temple. It happens *forty* days after his birth. It also marks, in the Jewish custom, the purification of his mother *forty* days after child-birth.

There is something quite profound in these traditions: the one honouring God for the birth of a child; the other, recognizing the uncertainties and wonder of child-birth itself. In the Book of Common Prayer, the latter sensibility contributes to a special liturgy commonly known as "The Churching of Women", which is otherwise known as a service of "Thanksgiving after Child-Birth".

Candlemas gives way to the season of the "Gesimas" – three Sundays which mark seventy (Septuagesima), sixty (Sexagesima) and then fifty (Quinquagesima) days before Easter. It is a season of transition, moving us from the beginnings of Christ's earthly life to the end of it. We move from the light of Christmas to the life of Easter; from the birth at Bethlehem to the passion and Resurrection at Jerusalem. The purification and presentation of Candlemas then is a turning point - it anticipates the transition from light overcoming darkness, to life conquering death.

We begin our preparation for Easter in the season of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday; this year it is on 6th March. It is *forty* days until Easter (omitting the Sundays). *Forty* days witnessing to the *forty* days spent by Christ in the wilderness being tested by the devil.

We encounter *forty* again in the period between Easter and the Ascension. And it was *forty* years after the death of Jesus in 30AD that the Temple was destroyed.

Forty is indeed a significant number. Stephen.

**Ash Wednesday—Wednesday 6th March.** The season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on 6th March. There will be the usual Wednesday celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30 a.m.; and then again **with a Sung Eucharist at 6pm**, with the imposition of ashes, as we begin our walk with Christ as He faces all the trials and temptations of the devil. We remember our own mortality, that we are but dust and to dust we shall return, but for our hope in the Resurrection.

**APCM—Sunday 17th March.** Our annual meetings to hear reports on various aspects of our common life together and elect the churchwardens and PCC will be held after the Sung Eucharist on 17th March (the Second Sunday in Lent). Please make a note of the date in your diary now.

**Quiet Day for Lent—Saturday 23rd March: 11 a.m.—4 p.m**. Fr Peter Huckle SSJE will lead a Quiet Day for Lent for us based on the theme *Who do you say that I am? (St Matthew 16 – St Peter's confession at Caesarea Philippi)*. All welcome, whether regular or new to St Botolph's. Further details nearer the time.

#### Old Wine—Monday 10th June: 5.30 p.m.—9.30 p.m.

This event, arranged in conjunction with the Prayer Book Society, is to promote the better understanding and greater usage of the Prayer Book.

Old Wine takes its name from the text St Luke 5.39, which states: "No man also having drunk old wine straightway desireth new: for he saith, The old is better."

It will comprise a mixture of worship and panel presentations and discussion of various aspects of Using the Prayer Book. The event is aimed primarily at ordinands, but is also open to others, both clergy and laity, who are interested in the subject matter.

Chaired by Bishop Rowan Williams, the speakers include our own Andrew Morris, our Rural Dean, Fr Rob Mackley, and a former ordinand well known to us, Revd Fergus Butler-Gallie.

We are to provide a Supper for all delegates and a call for volunteers to assist in the preparation and clearing away of the Supper will be made nearer the time.

Members of the Development Action Planning Group are overseeing the arrangements.

The purpose of arranging this event is to raise the profile of St Botolph's locally and its usage of the Prayer Book for worship. Bookings are already being received.
