From the Priest in Charge Dear Friends,

Record heatwaves, droughts and wild fires this summer have affected the UK. Almost everywhere, there has been little or no rain since May and the ground is hard and scorched from the sun. Rivers and reservoirs are drying up. Those of us who remember the summer of 1976, recall not only the hosepipe bans, but the stand by pipes and bowsers in the streets as the mains water supply was turned off during the day, the outbreak of ladybirds in late August and the near impossibility of buying potatoes well into the autumn.

Two things have characterised this summer's heatwave. Firstly, record day temperatures have affected not just the UK, but pretty much the whole of the Northern hemisphere – from North America to Europe to Russia and Asia (except the citizens of Iceland who have had nothing but rain!); and secondly there has not been much cooling at night, particularly in the Middle East, where temperatures have remained incredibly high – 43C in Oman, for example. The world is getting and remaining hotter.

Commentators have begun talking about this and the associated disasters in Biblical terms. The headline in *The Times* on 25th July gave the wildfires in Greece the quote "*A biblical disaster*". What does this mean?

It is true that God has sometimes caused extreme weather events and natural disasters to awaken us to His purposes for us—scripture tells us that God sent plagues to Egypt, a flood to Noah and a storm to Jonah, for example. The Book of Deuteronomy 11:17 warns that the anger of the LORD will be kindled against you, and he will shut up the heavens, so that there will be no rain, and the land will yield no fruit, and you will perish quickly off the good land that the LORD is giving you.

But it is not true that every extreme weather event is caused directly by God. God has given us our world to live in. He created it and He set the forces of nature. In much the same way that God allows

people to do wrong things, God allows the earth to reflect the consequences of people's actions on creation.

The evidence is that the world is warming, the polar ice caps which influence our weather are shrinking fast and heatwaves are becoming more frequent and extreme. We should see these as a megaphone from God, pointing to the consequences of our actions. Our misuse of creation cannot defy the natural laws that govern it. We are seeing the outcome of our own misuse.

It is time to remember that the world is God's world, not our own, and moderate our behavior accordingly. Otherwise it will not be God's actions that destabilize our climate, but our own.

St Paul, writing to the Romans, speaks of creation being subject to frustration in the hope that it will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the freedom and glory of the children of God (Romans 8:19-21). It envisages that we should be co-workers with God in the salvation of the whole of creation, not simply consumers of it to excess.
